

## MIDSTREAM OPERATIONS

- EQT's midstream operations include natural gas gathering, transportation, storage, and marketing activities in the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic United States.
- In 2012, EQT formed EQT Midstream Partners, LP (EQM), a growth-oriented limited partnership that provides midstream services to EQT and third parties. In 2015, EQT formed EQT GP Holdings, LP (EQGP), to own partnership interests in EQM. EQT owns a 90.1% limited partnership interest in EQGP and 100% of EQGP's non-economic general partner interest.
- Together, EQT and EQM own or operate approximately 9,100 miles of pipeline, including 900 miles of FERC-regulated interstate pipeline; and more than 1,500 miles of FERC-regulated low-pressure gathering lines, forming an extensive midstream infrastructure that allows us to gather, transport, store, and market natural gas in the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic United States.
- Additionally, our combined operations include more than 47 billion cubic feet of storage capacity.

### PIPELINE RIGHT-OF-WAY BASIC INFORMATION

- A right-of-way is the part of land over a gas or liquids pipeline. Property owners sign right-of-way agreements to give EQT permanent, but limited, rights to use the land to operate and maintain pipelines.
- EQT regularly inspects the rights-of-way for potential hazards.
- If a pipeline right-of-way is on your property, do not dig or store anything on or near the right-of-way without first contacting the proper authorities.

### PIPELINE SAFETY

- When managed properly, natural gas pipelines are the safest way to transport energy.
- Possible hazards associated with an unintended release from a gas pipeline facility include gas migrating near or inside a building, natural gas fires or natural gas explosions. Although these situations are not commonplace, caution needs to be exercised.

### ADDRESSING PIPELINE CONCERNS

- More than 20,000 miles of pipeline have been inspected in high population areas since 2004 under the EQT Integrity Management Program.
- In the past 20 years, even as populations, pipeline miles, and energy usage have grown, the number of serious incidents relating to natural gas pipelines has dropped 50%.
- Industry's goal for reauthorization of the Pipeline Safety Act is to remain focused on those activities that demonstrate improvements to safety performance.



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
